The Arnolfini Portrait is a 1434 oil painting on oak panel by the Early Netherlandish painter Jan van Eyck. It forms a full-length double portrait, believed to depict the Italian merchant Giovanni di Nicolao Arnolfini and his wife, presumably in their residence at the Flemish city of Bruges. It is considered one of the most original and complex paintings in Western art, because of its beauty, complex iconography, geometric orthogonal perspective, and expansion of the picture space with the use o

The confusion about the subject certainly arrives from the numerous details that Northern Renaissance is distinguished for, with every single one of them entailing specific symbolism.

The Western art history is saturated with outstanding masterpieces made throughout the centuries, and one of the authentic and enigmatic paintings is The Arnolfini Portrait by Jan van Eyck. It is a 82-per-60 cm oil painting made in 1434 on oak panel and it features a double portrait of the Italian merchant Giovanni di Nicolao Arnolfini and his wife, presumably in their Flemish home.

The Double portrait passed by descent to Mary of Hungary, who had moved to Spain in 1556. Her inventory from around 1558 includes the following: 'a large panel, with two doors with which it closes, and in it a man and a woman who take each other's hands, with a mirror in which the said man and woman are shown, and on the doors the arms of Don Diego de Guevara, done by Juanes de Hec, in the year 1434.'

Jan van Eyck. Born sometime around 1385 Jan van Eyck most likely studied under his brother, Herbert van Eyck. Jan worked under Philip the Good, Duke of Burgundy, and is responsible for the Ghent Altarpiece and the Arnolfini Portrait, two of the most famous paintings of the early Northern Renaissance.

It was only a century later that an entry in an inventory suggested the double portrait as possibly being that of Giovanni di Nicolao Arnolfini, a prosperous merchant from Lucca, who had an office in Bruges, and his wife Giovanna Cenami, daughter of an Italian banker. This possibility is now considered unlikely.

Hung in the fifteenth-century Netherlandish painting room of the National Gallery, Jan van Eyck ' s 1434 Arnolfini Portrait has been a source of intrigue, mystery and vastly differing readings since its purchase by the gallery in 1842. Measuring just under one metre in height, this oil panel – commonly understood to be a member of the prominent Italian Arnolfini family and his wife – is replete with detail.

Van Eyck, as a prime figure in Early Netherlandish painting of Northern Renaissance Art, was a master of natural symbolism and use of linear perspective. At first glance, Jan Van Eyck ' s Arnolfini Portrait (1434) appears to be an exquisitely rendered but otherwise straightforward depiction of a wealthy merchant and his wife. But take a second look (or third or fourth), and a more intriguing image emerges.
